Welcome to Christ Church!

Christ Church is heir to a rich tradition of spirituality that makes use of all the senses and draws our bodies as well as our minds into worship. In particular, incense is used as a sign of prayer ascending, as a sign that persons or objects are to be used for God's purposes. The essential thing is to hear God's word, to pray for ourselves and for others, and to fulfill Jesus' command, "do this in remembrance. . ." You are welcome to participate as fully as seems right to you and we welcome questions and conversation.

This leaflet carries most of the text of the liturgy and some explanations of the rites. The hymns are found in the blue hymnal at your seats. The Book of Common Prayer is the red book at your seat.

The booklet indicates where it is the custom of this congregation to make gestures:

- \blacksquare Indicates where the sign of the cross is customarily made.
- Bow Indicates where this gesture of reverence is customarily made.
- Kneel Indicates where this gesture of reverence is customarily made.

Procession & Blessing of Candles

The Ministers move in procession to the West End of the church, where an Altar has been erected. The church bells are rung.



Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace: according to thy word. For mine eyes have seen thy salvation, which thou hast prepared before the face of all people; to be a light to lighten the Gentiles and to be the glory of thy people Israel. At the West End of the church, the Celebrant begins the rite, blessing the candles to be used in this procession and in the parish for the coming year.



Celebrant Let us pray.

O Lord Jesus Christ, who art the true light that enlightens everyone who cometh into the world: we beseech thee to pour out thy blessing upon these candles and sanctify them with the light of thy grace; and mercifully grant, that even as they with their outward flame do scatter the darkens of night; so our heart being enlighted by the inwards brightness of thy Holy Spirit may be delivered from all blindness of iniquity: that in thy light, we may discern those things that are pleasing unto thee and which lead us to thy salvation; that finally after the darkness and dangers of this world, we may attain in the end to light everlasting, through thy everlasting mercies. **Amen**.

O God our Father, the source and creator of light, who didst on this day reveal to the aged Simeon thy light which enlighteneth the Gentiles, dispel all darkness of our souls, and brighten the path that lies before us; and pour out thy blessing on these candles with which this earthly temple will be illumined, that we who kindle them and bear them to thy glory may come at the last to stand in thy eternal light, through him who is the light of the world and the glory of the people Israel, thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

O Lord Jesus Christ, who art the temple of the Heavenly Jerusalem, and its light and surpassing splendor, grant that we, who in this place offer thee our worship, may walk in the light of thy presence through all our mortal pilgrimage, for with the Father and the Holy Ghost, thou dost live and reign in glory everlasting. **Amen**.

The People light their candles from the torches as they pass along the aisle to the High Altar.

During the procession, the Choir sings **The Introit**

The Liturgy of the Word

The First Reading

Malachi 3:1-4

Thus says the Lord, See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.



The Epistle

Since God's children share flesh and blood, Jesus himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.


Reader: The Word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.



When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, the parents of Jesus brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons." Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for

glory to your people Israel." And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed-- and a sword will pierce your own soul too." There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.

During an organ improvisation, the People's candles are lit from torches brought by acolytes down the aisle. As a sign that along with the gifts we are all offered to God's work, the People and Celebrant are censed. The People and Thurifer acknowledge each other with a bow before and after the censing.





At the Communions

All are welcome at the altar of Christ Church. Baptized Christians may receive the Sacrament in the palm or on the tongue; receive the chalice by helping guide it to your lips or by intinction (touching the host to the wine in the chalice). Cross your arms in front of you (hands touching your shoulders) to receive a blessing instead. You may stand or kneel at the altar rail. If coming forward is difficult, please advise an usher, who will notify the clergy to bring communion to you at your seat.


