John Ferguson – renowned internationally for his Hymn Festivals – is with us this morning to lead us in a festive, celebratory service of song.

John Ferguson is a renowned organist, choir director, Professor, composer and arranger. His name is always closely associated with hymnody and the words “hymn festival” - every year he is invited to design and lead such events all over the world, for local congregations, and at gatherings of church musicians. His hymn festivals are ecumenical experiences drawing upon the Christian song from many centuries, traditions, and styles – and they are never, ever dull!

Tuesday October 8th

Today in worship we will focus on our relationship with God. This will be a time of word and music that looks at how we know our God and how we interact with and relate to God. We will take time to both celebrate our intimate relationship with God and reflect on how we can become closer to God. The Marquand Gospel and Inspirational Ensemble will provide some music to aid in this celebration and introspection along with student preacher Derick Dailey.

Wednesday October 9th: Sung Morning Prayer

O God Beyond All Praising – a setting by Colin Britt

This week we will sing again this popular Sung Morning Prayer setting by former Director of Music, Colin Britt. It includes a 9th century chant, “Veni creator spiritus”, Isaiah Jones’ gospel setting of “Fill My Cup,” John Bell and Graham Maule’s delightful arrangement of the Caribbean “Halle, Halle, Halle,” and the Sacred Harp tune, “Christians, We Have Met to Worship.” This service also features a Russian Lord’s Prayer setting, by Nikolai Kedrov, Sr., and a psalm setting from the Siberian province of Tuva. The title for this cycle comes from the Michael Perry text set to the hymn tune Thaxted, by Gustav Holst, a melody familiar to many from the Jupiter movement of Holst’s “The Planets” (Opus 32).

Thursday October 10th: A Celtic Service of Prayer

In the Western Highlands and Islands of Scotland, prayer in the ancient Celtic Tradition was on the verge of disappearing when Alexander Carmichael gathered prayers, songs and sayings from country folk and published them in *CARMINA GADELICA (SONGS OF THE GAELS)* at the end of the 19th century.

Our morning liturgy uses material adapted from that collection of fragments. What is of special interest is that few, if any, of these prayers came from ministers or priests. They were shared in families through the centuries by people who lived often without the benefit of clergy, yet believed deeply and prayed reverently. Come join us for a service of song and prayer in the Celtic tradition.
